Dr. Jones had a full time slot with the introduction of our six guests and leading the birthday song with the help of our resident musician **John Appleyard**.

Dr. **Kenneth Hill** was called to the podium to be receive the Paul Harris +2 award. Congratulations Dr. Hill! **C. Ray Jones** was also called to the podium to provide a brief history on the origination of the Paul Harris award. President Betty then shared the week's history lesson provided by John Appleyard. Andrea Krieger introduced our guest speaker, Dr. Ed Meadows, President of the Pensacola State College, who reviewed PSC's many accolades. He began his remarks by highlighting how many members have touched or been touched by PSC. Roughly 50-60% of the members were standing as having been involved some way with PSC That's not too surprising since PSC has been a key educational institution since 1948 with over 109,000 graduates to date. Given the history of PSC's accomplishments, it's also not surprising the list is way too long to do it justice in this space. Brochures with detailed information were distributed on our tables but here are just a few highlights:

- Seventeen professional programs have national accreditation. Two very high in-demand occupations are nursing and cybersecurity.
- PSC ranks well on various measures, e.g., best value among public four-year colleges and universities for the 7th consecutive year (U.S. Dept. of Education), and 13th for top public colleges and universities southern region (U.S. News and World Report).
- It has been named a military friendly school for nine consecutive years and a 'Best for Vets' College 2016-18 by the Military Times.
- PSC is the only educational institution with its own satellite PBS station.

PSC plans to build on its long list of accomplishments. Dr. Meadows reviewed its many campuses and centers, including the construction of new facilities and modernization of old facilities to assist with its growth. And, YOU – as Rotarians – have contributed to this success by helping students along the way with Rotary Clubs Endowed Scholarships totaling \$412,000+ since 2002. Having graduated from PJC myself in the 70's, this writer can attest to PSC's tremendous progress over the years.

President Betty closed the meeting by thanking the speaker and all of those that volunteered to help make this another successful meeting. See you at the next meeting, if not sooner out and about town.
