President Ray called Henry Roberts to the podium for Sunshine. Dr. Roberts introduced 3 visiting Rotarians and there were no military guests present. Henry then proceeded to throw the senior leadership team of Baptist Healthcare under the bus with a joke about sex, God and mystery - racy stuff! The Club then sang a rousing "Happy Birthday You All" to Jules Carrier and RP Doyle who was 49 years old again.

Margaret Stopp then introduced our speaker, John Appleyard, who presented a program on the history of naval aviation and honoring the legacy of CONA or Centennial of Naval Aviation which is currently being celebrated by our community. John stated that the idea to establish a Navy Yard in Pensacola was rooted in the efforts of James Monroe and John Quincy Adams to mitigate the Spanish influence in the state of Florida. The Monroe Doctrine was issued in 1823 and the following year the Naval Yard was established in Pensacola which sported a population of approximately 800 at the The effort was led by time. Admiral Warrington and Captain William Chase was charged with building forts across the bay as protection for the Navy facilities. The forts were completed in 1849. Another date of note was 1833 when the Naval Hospital was established. The Pensacola Naval Yard received its first and only assignment to build ships in 1856 and the USS Pensacola and USS Seminole were christened

shortly thereafter. 1870 marked the first version of BRAC to review the missions of various bases and additional versions followed in 1880, 1895 and 1910. Admiral Young announced the impending closure of the facility to city fathers in 1910 and it was mothballed the following year.

The early 1900's ushered in the era of Naval Aviation following the invention of the dirigible by Count Zeppelin of Germany. The effort to create airplanes in the US was launched around 1908 as Glen Curtiss and the Wright Brothers pursued parallel efforts. Eugene Ely convinced the Navy to pursue flight from their ships with the Curtiss aircraft. The effort was initiated in Annapolis, Maryland but winter weather conditions were not conducive to flight operations and in 1914 Admiral Chambers initiated Naval flight ops in Pensacola. In its first years 7 amphibious planes were housed in canvas tents. Flight operations ramped up with the onset of WWI and subsequently over 500 pilots were trained here. The Navy shifted the focus of flight operations to a land-based program in 1921 and city fathers responded by locating an 800 acre parcel of land that later became Corry Field. The training mission continued into the 30's and 40's and moved into high gear during WWII and over 50,000 aviators were trained locally. The late 30's also saw the formation of the Top Hatters which were the predecessors to the Blue Angels precision flight team. Pensacola's proud tradition has carried on with the success of the Naval Aviation Museum and the recent efforts to establish the Flight Academy.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.
