WEEK IN REVIEW

The Valentine's Day 2012 meeting of the Rotary Club of Pensacola took place on a sunny and warm February day. Rotarian John Clark greeted members, and Martin Harwood did a fine job selling raffle tickets. Gary Sammons was the lucky winner of the \$67 prize.

President Alan called the meeting to order with the 4-Way Test, and Shawn Brantley led us in thoughtful prayer and the Pledge of Allegiance. Kathy Horton-Brown updated the Club on the latest trips to India to deliver and assemble desks for students who are currently studying and working on dirt floors. Alan reported for Clif Payne that the next Habitat For Humanity build is March 3. Clif needs volunteers and asks that members who can swing a hammer for a few hours please contact him. Ed Ranelli reported that it is time for nominations for the Ethics in Business Awards. There are two categories, one award for small businesses with up to 100 employees, and one for large businesses employing more than 100 people. Charlie Sherrill did a masterful job with Sunshine for the day, and entertained the crowd with a good tale of a mixed up Christmas gift. Where's the punch line, Chuckles? He then welcomed a handful of visiting Rotarians, including a long-distance visitor from Kokomo, Indiana, and sang Happy Birthday You-All to members with birthdays this week.

Carol Law introduced today's speaker, our own John Appleyard, resident historian, author, lecturer, and a Valentine of his wife for 65 years. John's program for the day was, fittingly, a discussion on the history of Love, Marriage, and St. Valentine's Day through the ages. He explained that there are no less than a halfdozen versions of the start of Valentine's Day itself, but the story he likes best comes from the third century Roman times when Emperor Claudius II decided that single men made better soldiers than those with wives and families, so he outlawed marriage for young men. But a Catholic priest named St. Valentine realized the injustice of the decree, defied Claudius and continued to perform marriages for young lovers in secret. When Valentine's actions were discovered, Claudius ordered that he be put to death. Just prior to his execution, St. Valentine became smitten with the daughter of Claudius, who was bringing food to him in prison, and honored her with a small gift, thus one version of the advent of Valentine's Day.

The choosing of a wife and the institution of marriage has quite a history, too. John explained that the cartoon versions of ancient man taking a mate with help from a club or weapon may not be too far off from true life in those days. A few hundred thousand years

later, marriage became an arranged ceremony based on ideals, money, property, and social class, but typically were arranged by the families, not by the prospective bride and groom. Some marriages were by proxy, some involved a dowry, some required a bride price, but few had any sort of courtship or dating period. Eventually, during what became known as the Victorian Era, courtship and proper etiquette did become taken very seriously among young women, and from the time she was young, a woman was groomed for this role in life - dutiful wife and mother. Properly trained, she learned to sing, play piano or guitar, dance and be conversant about light literature of the day. She also learned the rules of etiquette as well as the art of conversation and the art of silence.

Mr. Appleyard said things began to change soon after World War II when the explosion of the movie and television industry helped change society and weaken social values that had ruled the day for many decades. Today, marriage is not the institution it once was, and statistics show about 55% of marriages end in divorce, and nearly 65% of all child births are to single-parent homes. Where is Queen Victoria when we need her?

President Alan thanked those who helped make the meeting enjoyable, and adjourned at 1:00.
