WEEK IN REVIEW 03/07/2017

The weekly meeting of The Rotary Club Downtown was held at New World Landing on Tuesday, March 7, 2017. We were graciously greeted at the door by John Tice and raffle tickets were sold by Paul Tobin. President Sherry Hartnett called the meeting to order and led us in the four way test. Chris Kelly led us in prayer and pledge. President Sherry then brought up Ed Meadows to remind us that the deadline is fast approaching for nominations for the Ethics in Business Award. The awards will be handed out at a luncheon on May 1.

Registration for the district conference ends on March 26. The conference is being held in San Destin on April 6 & 7th. Everyone is encouraged to register now. Innes Richards reminded us that registration for RLI is ongoing. The cost is \$95.00 and everyone is encouraged to attend.

Sally Fox followed up with sunshine. She started out by introducing our guests and visiting Rotarians. Then announced birthdays – all birthday honorees were in attendance. The \$42.00 raffle was awarded and Betty Roberts

came up to introduce our guest speaker.

Today's speaker was Connie Bookman, who runs "The Pathways for Change" program. She spoke from the heart about the program which has seen considerable success in this area. Pathways for Change was stated in 2003, When Connie developed a program offering a faith based curriculum and psychotherapy to female inmates at the Escambia County Jail. In 2005, Connie and a tem of clinical staff and interns established a daily program and curriculum for women in the Jail's Central Booking and Detention Center. Through multiple partnerships within the Escambia County System, a program was created for educational and vocational skills, to help PFC participants earn a paycheck, but also fulfill a purpose. Many PFC grads are currently working as plumbers, electricians, landscapers, business administrators, etc. In June 2006, PFC moved to the County Work Release Center and started the Men's Residential Treatment Program. In 2012 PFC developed an Aftercare Program for graduates of the Men's Residential Treatment program, to

further invest in counseling, employment and school goals. Studies show that the longer the clients are engaged with treatment, the greater the change of success. And in 2014, Pathways for Change, in partnership with Community Enterprise Investments opened the Clinton Cox Residence as a sober home that assists people with treatment for drug and alcohol problems or coming out of prison. The 12 room Clinton Cox Residence is a nurturing environment suited to keep program members away from the streets while they are transitioning back to productive members of the community. The Pathways for Change program has a 70% success rate.

The Family Center is Pensacola's anti poverty program serving underprivileged neighborhoods of those living at or below poverty level. The Family Center has had a far reaching, positive impact on residents living in Escambia County. Connie ended by answering a few questions about the programs.

President Sherry thanked the volunteers and speakers and adjourned the meeting.


